

Ole J. Sneide Will Contested By Relatives

The will of Ole J. Sneide, seer of the "flying discs" and San Francisco occultist, was under fire from several relatives yesterday.

They said they would file suit to set aside his distribution of an estate of more than \$10,000. His will directed that the money be used to erect a statue of Aphrodite and for publication of his occult manuscripts under the title "Helm-rhibeat."

Attorney Jack Moller of Stockton said he would file in a few days on grounds that the retired San Francisco accountant was incompetent and that the will is improperly executed. His clients are Sneide's brothers and sisters: A. M. C. Sneide, 77, of Stockton, Paul and Bertha Sneide and Mrs. Synnevie Asbjornsen, all of Duluth, and Mrs. Jennie Kriken of Seattle.

Sneide died in August, only a few months after his widely-publicized explanation of the summer's "flying saucers." The "saucers," said Sneide, were intellectuals from outer space. He claimed to have got his knowledge by launching himself into space by occult means.
